• From 1951-2010 “for most of the CONUS [conterminous United States], drought frequency appears to have **decreased** during the 1901 through 2014 period.” – *International Journal of Climatology*, May 6, 2016

• “Drought in the U.S. fell to a record low this week, with just 6.1% of the lower 48 states currently experiencing such dry conditions, federal officials announced Thursday.” – *USA Today*, April 27, 2017

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Drought

• Globally, there has been "no significant trend in the areas under drought over land in the past three decades."
Moreover, "central Africa, parts of Southeast Asia (e.g., Thailand, Taiwan), Central America, northern Australia, and parts of eastern Europe show a wetting trend during the same time span." – *Theoretical and Applied Climatology*, September 29, 2013
